This festival encapsulates that spirit of determination and perseverance, and will be a wonderful opportunity for us to come together as pupils, parents and staff to celebrate the amazing progress and contributions your children make each and every day- I really hope to see as many of you there as possible.

Speech and Language Therapy – a priority for Dartmoor Multi Academy Trust

Coming out of the pandemic, there was an awareness that increased numbers of students were having issues with speech and language, and waiting lists for assessments were delayed due to the increase in referral numbers. So, an initiative was put together, where Dartmoor Multi Academy Trust could react more quickly when a problem has been identified and also disseminate good practice through our teaching staff. This was an area where we needed to improve the provision for students especially for nursery and reception children.

Work was undertaken in researching how a Speech and Language Therapist (SALT) could be employed by the Trust working across all 17 of its schools. With a fully trained professional filling this role, it would also mean the Trust could support SALT students from Marjon university by offering them placements in schools as part of their degrees. The Trust were fortunate to employ Katy Mullin who started with the Trust in March and works 2 days a week. She is a fully qualified speech and language therapist who is based in St James, but covers the whole of the Trust. Katy has previous experience working in a SEMH school in Devon and prior to that, working independently and in the NHS.

Members from the Trust's Community Team, Melissa Trudgill, Derrick Brett and Suzie Stevens, Principal of St James Primary School were successful in a grant application to the Laurel Trust which is funding a research project to understand whether SALT intervention at an early age has considerably more impact than if it is introduced later on. This project will involve EYFS staff being trained in 2 intervention groups to deliver a language intervention and a speech sound intervention. Derick Brett said "we are very fortunate in receiving this grant as it will support the work we were planning to do and the research project will be beneficial for the Trust and beyond. We want to be efficient in the way we deliver interventions and the more research we can do in this area, the better the results for our pupils will be."




Our focus is now on building relationships with the children and young people who will be joining us and also getting to understand them better through partnership working with their parents/carers.



New Community Fridge to Open!

Melissa Trudgill, Community Engagement Manager at the Trust has been developing partnerships with Holsworthy Town Council, Mutual Aid Group, Live West, Holsworthy Library and TTVS to work together to set up the first Community Fridge in Torridge. It is due to open in June and will be located in front of the Library in Holsworthy.

The amazing thing about this project is that it is sustainable by using the surplus from local food suppliers which would go out of area and be thrown away and offers the food to local people who can put it to good use. Melissa said 'this is a green project and I have been encouraged by the support from local food suppliers who are keen to see their food surplus stay within the Town and be used by the community rather than go to waste'.

As we all strive to drive our carbon footprint down this is a sustainable project beneficial to the environment where food would otherwise be going to waste. The fridge can be used by those wishing to top up their universal credit and are finding it hard to make ends meet in these challenging times to the single person who may just want a few mushrooms or one orange rather than a whole bag. No one is turned away or has to meet certain criteria to take food.

We hope that this initiative will be supported by a bank of local volunteers and that in the future we can set up rural larders or more town fridges using the same model.

New forest school provides outside learning for children

With the Summer fast approaching volunteers from the local community joined together to help build a forest school area at St James Primary School in Okehampton this week as part of Dartmoor Multi Academy Trust's AWE scheme of projects. The Trust's AWE (Awe, Wonder & Environment) Projects rejuvenate school facilities, with the help of willing teams of staff, governors, older students and the wider community. On this occasion, it was the amazing support of LiveWest which made this transformation possible.

Melissa Trudgill, Community Engagement Manager for Dartmoor Multi Academy Trust said: "The children of St James Primary School were amazed by the transformation of this previously, unused area into an outside creative learning space, where they can enjoy the outdoors, play in the mud kitchen, listen to stories in the outdoor seating area grow vegetables and learn from nature. This is a collaborative project where the Trust worked with the School's PTFA, DMAT estates team and volunteers from **LiveWest** and after a lot of planning created a new, much needed space on one day! Thank you, LiveWest."

The Trust's community team of Derrick Brett, Executive Director of Civic Leadership and Melissa Trudgill, Community Engagement Manager facilitated the project bringing partners together from the community, the school and the PTFA. Vicki Norris, member of St James PTFA worked tirelessly with her PTFA team to raise funds, plan the space and negotiate materials to make the event a success. The Trust is delighted that LiveWest will also be involved in an AWE Project at Okehampton Primary School and in the Holsworthy Community Fridge project.

Recently, pupils from Okehampton Primary School were treated to a creative train trip thanks to the

Devon and Cornwall Rail Partnership.

The pupils travelled from Okehampton to Exeter on the recently opened new railway line and used the train as a creative, travelling classroom. The children made a parcel pet on board the trainparcel pets start life as a small cardboard box, but are individualised by the children using a variety of colourful craft items.

Parcel Pets are named and personalities created and thus the art-based activity is also linked to literacy. On this occasion the children made 2 parcel pets; one for themselves and one for an older resident of Okehampton. The two parcel pets are then pen pals, and the Devon and Cornwall Rail Partnership encourages interaction between the two as a way of tackling social isolation. Luckily the Kents House Care Home were keen to be involved and this was where the trip ended – with the children delivering the 'pets' they had made on the train.
