I would like to pass my sincere thanks to the staff team who have worked tirelessly to share our school with the inspector team over the last two days and their work over the last 18 months since our previous inspection. Their effort and commitment is unrivalled. Education is in the unique position of having an external inspecting body that provides less than a day's notice of inspection and despite this pressure, the staff were calm and confident it what they shared.

This week's inspection was a full graded inspection, meaning judgements on 'The quality of education', 'Behaviour and attitudes', 'Personal development' and 'Leadership and management' will be made as well as an overall judgement. There will be no judgement of the Early Years Foundation Stage as there are fewer than 5 children in that group although this will be referenced in the report.

School staff have been informed of the preliminary judgements and this will be shared with families and the community after quality assurance and accuracy processes are completed. This can take up to 10 weeks.

I can assure you that having two inspectors in a school of our size for two days means that every child and staff member was spoken to, books and learning looked at and multiple lessons, break and lunch times visited – it certainly was a robust process and I am certain the report will reflect the current state of our school. Parent voice, too, is vitally important and I thank all of those who completed parent view, spoke to or wrote to the inspector team.

Numbot/Times Tables Rock Stars

Your child has a personal log-in for either NumBots (EYFS AND Key Stage 1) or Times Table Rockstars (Key Stage 2). Times Table Rockstars is a carefully sequenced programme of daily times table practice. NumBots supports children with their understanding, recall and fluency in mental addition and subtraction so they move from counting to calculating. Please support your child to log into their account. Regular practice really is key to your child making progress in these areas.



Medicine in School

Under the Trust Policy, we are unable to administer any medicine to a child that has not been prescribed by their doctor. Please do not send children to school with medicine in their bags to administer themselves. All medicine should be handed to a member of staff.

Attendance update

This year, we really want to work with our students and families to ensure that every child attends school as much as possible. Children with attendance over 97% will benefit emotionally, socially as well as academically.

We are committed to developing positive, open, and effective communication between home and school and providing support, advice and guidance for parents/carers and pupils when needed.

In order to do this, we will regularly be communicating with families about their child's attendance in several ways, including;

- Regular attendance focus on newsletters to share important information and updates.
- Every parent/carer will be informed about their child's attendance by email twice each half term we would really appreciate your support in talking to your child about their attendance and celebrating with them when they have consistently been in school every day, or when they have tried really hard to improve their attendance.
- Your child's Class teacher will contact you to ensure everything is OK and offer support following any unauthorised absence, after 3 days of consecutive absence or after 3 incidents of absence within a 4-week period.
- In line with our policy, parents/carers will receive letters regarding their child's attendance should it fall beneath 95%. Where attendance is below 90% and either the family or school has identified any areas that need additional support, an attendance meeting will be arranged and in partnership, personalised and achievable targets for pupils will be developed, based on their individual needs and circumstances.
- Parents/Carers will be informed twice a year about the process for requesting absence during term time and the processes involved should an
 absence not be considered an exceptional circumstance.

What Parents & Carers Need to Know about

A multiplayer 'social deduction' game set in outer space, Among Us enjoyed a surge in popularity in 2020, and has since maintained a dedicated fan-base (globally, around 60 million regular players each month) thanks to its unique nature, simple premise and ease of access across numerous platforms. The game's on-screen

action revolves around danger, disguise and deception - and there are certain parallels to be drawn with

some of the real-life risks that parents and carers of young Among Us players need to be aware of.

WHAT ARE THE RISKS?

SENSITIVE PREMISE

VIRTUAL VIOLENCE

The on-screen death of characters may be fundamental to the gameplay of Among Us, but the majority of the animations depicting this are deliberately cartoonish and only appear very briefly. However, it is worth bearing in mind that the game has a PEGI age rating of 7 - meaning that certain elements (however heavily stylised they may be) could still upset some younger players.

CHAT BETWEEN PLAYERS

h up to 15 people participating ach game online, a large part of ong Us' appeal is speculating with ow players who the imposters int be and making accusations. s dialogue through the in-game tchat can occasionally become sted – and could, of course, involve ir child being put into contact with pile (including adults) who they 't know in real life.

ays to communicate, man imers prefer to use extern rvices such as Discord: a free such as discord: a app which offers voice chat functions. 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Advice for Parents & Carers

CONSIDER SOFTER ALTERNATIVES

Although Among Us is hugely popular with young gamers, it's possible that some children might find the murder themes unsettling. If so, plenty of similar social deduction games are available (in both digital and traditional board game formats) which downplay the potentially grislier elements: some centre around undercover spies, for instance, and there's even a Marvel superhero-themed variant.

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AMONG US, AMONG FRIENDS

When your child and their friends get together, they can enjoy a private game of Among Us by choosing a 'local' lobby – that is, only people connected to the same WiFi (your home network, for example) can enter. This prevents any random online users – who may be total strangers – from joining and removes the need for voice chat, as the players are all physically in the same location.

CHAT ABOUT CHATTING

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You might feel it's prudent to talk to your child about the risks associated with voice chat while gaming, explaining in particular that strangers online aren't always who they claim to be. Keeping the conversation relaxed will reinforce your child's confidence that they can always come to you with any online concerns – not just about Among Us, but any potential future issues as well.

DISCUSS DISCORD

In general, Discord is an excellent app for keeping online communities together because of its use of dedicated individual servers, which allow comprehensive control over who can join – and who can't. Once you're familiar with the platform, you could set up a secure server for your child and their friends to communicate during games of Among Us, with no access for people they don't know.

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STOP SURPRISE SPENDING

If you're concerned about the possibility of your child racking up an unexpected bill on Among Us' microtransactions, you could consider using a prepaid card with a set limit. Likewise, you could specify in the game's options that adult authorisation is required for every purchase – or you could make sure that no payment methods are enabled on the device that your child plays the game on.
