
Black Torrington School Wedding: As one of our staff was getting

Okehampton Primary School are looking forward to being involved in The Moor Otters project next year, in collaboration with Dartmoor National Trust. Six lucky winners will be painting their own mini otter, to support the Main Otter Art Trail which spans across Dartmoor and hosts over 80 decorated otters. Luna Redhead will lead an art workshop for the six chosen winners to create their own miniature version, which will then join an exhibition of work from school children in Plymouth next Summer.

As a Trust we are delighted that we have been able to provide **Chromebooks** for children in years 11, 10, 6 & 5 who are in receipt of Pupil Premium funding and do not have access to a device at home. We are currently trying to source further

devices to be able to support children within the other year groups. By providing devices to these children, they will be able to access learning from home, should we be in a lockdown situation or if they need to isolate for any reason.



Going Green in 2021

2021 will be the Trust's 'Greenest' yet, thanks to our successful bid for government funding. Through its Public Sector Decarbonisation Scheme (PSDS), the Department for Business, Energy, and Industrial Strategy has awarded us a fantastic £220,000!

This will be used to improve the Building Management Systems across our schools, source new air source heat pumps, install LED lighting across many

of our campuses and much more. Not only will these changes greatly reduce our energy output and carbon footprint, but also save the Trust a potentially huge amount of money. In fact, we have calculated that these changes may lead to energy savings of more than 450,000 kWh per year, which in turn could save the schools more than £45,000 per year.

While you will soon see changes come to life across our schools, a huge thanks must first go to Keith Webber, who has been an inspirational driving force behind this!
